Most importantly, we are empathetic to the struggles business and residential members are experiencing during this economic downturn and promote open dialogue with respect to members' ability to maintain payment schedules with their electric bills.

Emily Mineral Project Signs Historic Agreements

We are extremely pleased to announce final agreements were signed in April between our subsidiary, Cooperative Mineral Resources and North Star Manganese Inc (NSM), a company we have been working with since 2018. It's with great pleasure that we share with you the news of this extremely important undertaking.

Many of you, that have been following the development of the Emily Manganese Project, understand the ups and downs of negotiating and progression in a competitive corporate initiative such as this. And, because this is a private, for-profit corporate project outside of our core business, it has led to some controversy and misunderstanding on non-disclosure/confidentiality requirements we respectfully adhere to with other parties. We've addressed and responded to concerns and misinformation to the best of our ability in newsletters and newspapers.

We purchased land and mineral rights in Emily in 2008, in an attempt to capitalize on an endeavor that has the ability to reap millions of dollars for your Cooperative and gain momentum in the futuristic development in the electric utility industry with Electric Vehicle and Electric Storage batteries. The investment was made with previously earned investment dollars earmarked from another successful business enterprise with Hunt Technologies, one of our subsidiaries.

Over the years, we used \$23 million of those earned investment dollars to advance the project to attract the right company capable of developing a mine that has the potential to create local jobs and reap huge financial returns for Cooperative members, the City of Emily, school districts, Crow Wing County and the State of Minnesota.

Understandably, we've entertained several potential mining suitors and signed initial Memorandum of Understandings with several of them, who ultimately did not meet our stringent requirements for such a partner. However, NSM has met our expectations.

We developed the Project to this point and now look forward to NSM taking charge to move the Project toward a commercially feasible mining project.

We are pleased to rely on the expertise of principals of NSM in their 30 plus years of experience in other mining/mineral ventures.

This is a historic time for Crow Wing Power – let's look forward to the NSM development of this deposit and a mining plan that meets our environmentally conscientious and local dedication for the benefit of our members and region.



Operation Round-Up donated \$278,000 to 73 charitable organizations in 2019. Grant applications are reviewed by the Crow Wing Power Community Trust Board made up of nine Cooperative members, separate from the Crow Wing Power Board of Directors. The program, begun in 1996, has donated \$3.6 million locally.



Trustees were able to provide over \$60,000 to help so far this year specifically for that purpose. Operation Round-Up collaborates with other local foundations to keep our communities strong.

Scholarships to Students

Crow Wing Power was able to award \$76,731 to 63 area high school seniors in the three-county area we serve. Crow Wing Power members' children from eleven high schools are the recipients. The program is made available from unclaimed capital credits. When capital credit checks are returned, we make every effort to find members that may have moved and not kept their address current. By law, the Cooperative holds those funds for seven years before they are released.

Crow Wing Power Credit Union was established in 1999 to provide not-for-profit financial services to members. Today, it has over 5,400 members. In the last 21 years it has grown to become a full-service financial institution with \$83 million in deposits and \$56 million in loans. The Credit Union has eleven full-time employees.

SERVICE ADVANCEMENTS

Technological Advancements in the Field

Meter Upgrades

Crow Wing Power is always looking at utilizing proven technology to improve our service to members. We began a meter exchange program a couple of years ago to upgrade our then aging Automated Meter Reading system. The new Advanced Metering Infrastrucure is helping us serve members better with improved efficiency, reliability and power quality.

The replacement project, begun in March 2018, made great strides in 2019 and by the end of the year, we completed our system infrastructure and upgraded 62% of our 59,363 older meters. Currently, we have 98 % of the metering project completed and 46 % of our Load Management Controls upgraded.

In the process of physically replacing meters, technicians have found 1,704 wiring hazards, inaccessible meters and potential power outage situations. We have been successful in having most of these issues corrected.

The new metering system helps us provide more efficient and accurate information, better outage management control and gives members near real time information when looking at their electric use on SmartHub, the online management tool.

Access to Information

SmortHub - SmartHub has features that make managing your account easily accessible, whether through the web, or your smartphone or tablet. As soon as you log in, you are able to view your bill, billing history, usage or make a payment in just a couple of clicks. New this year, you can now connect through a smart home device like Amazon Echo or Google Home.



Paperless In The Field – New investments in technology have allowed our field crews to use devices instead of paper for receiving their daily job information. Using devices saves time and money. They can quickly and easily use real time information through a secure network for mapping, equipment in the field, and be alerted to possible hazards at a location.

Money Saving Programs

A total of 31% or over 11,000 Crow Wing Power members are enrolled in some type of load control program for heating, cooling and water heating. Members reap the benefit by paying a reduced electric rate and Crow Wing Power saves an excess of \$2 million a year on high demand wholesale power costs. Other members save money by upgrading appliances and lighting.

When members use energy more efficiently, it helps reduce the high demand for electricity during certain periods when wholesale power costs are high and assists in maintaining rates.


