Electrify Your Summer >>>

Throughout the past year, we have introduced you to electric lawn and garden tools and smart home gadgets. This month we want to give you additional insight on electric bikes or commonly known as e-bikes.

E-bikes have been gaining a lot of interest. The uptick in sales most recently can be attributed to a number of factors from fitness to emission conscious commuters, advancements in lithium-ion battery technology, and the isolation of the pandemic.

Most e-bikes have pedal assist, meaning there is some pedaling involved. Sure, regular bikes are going to give you a better workout, but for some e-bike owners they're saying they ride and are outdoors much more than if they just had a conventional bike and therefore, they are improving their cardio vascular systems and overall health.

We asked one couple what they like about the e-bikes they bought last summer. They said as a couple who owns two class 1 e-bikes we like that we are able to stay together on a trail even though we have different strength and ability levels. They take the bikes with them to Florida each year and love being able to use the bikes year round.

The majority of e-bikes cost between \$1,000 and \$4,000 but you can spend triple that amount depending on the manufacturer, battery capacity, and other customized options. There are four different classes of e-bikes that range from true pedal assist powered by the cyclist all the way to a Moped style with a full throttle.

Our research revealed just two e-bike rental locations and a few more places that do e-bike sales in our area. We met with Tim Wagner, owner of UpNorth Bike Rentals in downtown Nisswa. Tim recently made the switch from CPA to small business owner and opened his new shop in May. He has sixteen e-bikes for rent and he can help you

purchase through his manufacturer Electronic Bikes.

When looking to purchase an e-bike

he mentioned that you should know where you are typically riding, what is the distance you ride on average, how many amp hours the standard battery holds, and what you are willing to spend.

It was an exciting day, not only did we get to talk with Tim and learn about e-bikes, we actually were able to test one out. From a non-biker perspective, this is what we learned.

- The pedal assist was great to have, like changing gears on your typical ten-speed, you would push a button to get some extra help and adjust as needed for your ability. This ranged from a 1- (80% pedaling/20% assist) to a 4- (10% pedaling/90% assist).
- These bikes can go very fast, up to 28 mph—wear a helmet.
- There is a throttle, meaning you do not have to pedal at all and just push the throttle on the handle to do the work.

Different factors from speed, weight, and ability come into play when you talk about how long the battery can go on a charge. The charge utilizes a traditional electrical outlet. The pedal assist does not do a re-charge, however when the breaks are applied, there is some power regeneration to help conserve the battery.

As with anything new e-bikes might not be the only mode of transportation

in the future especially in our harsh Minnesota winters, it certainly provides an option as well as levels the playing field for groups of people that enjoy getting out together to bike.

A WORD FROM YOUR CEO

Heat Wave Causes Energy Emergency Alerts and High Cost of Power >>>

The recent prolonged heat wave that broke a multitude of heat related records, also triggered a Maximum Generation Emergency Warning from the Midcontinent Independent System Operator, Inc. (MISO) our region's grid operator that manages the generation and flow of electricity across high-voltage power lines.

On the afternoon of June 10 we, and other electric MISO member utilities, were asked to issue a plea asking people to curtail their electric use until 10 p.m. We responded, as did our sister cooperatives asking the public and our cooperative members to cut back on their electric use. Simple conservation measures can allow customers to help keep the lights on and avoid blackouts. Conservation appeals are part of MISO's emergency operating procedures that help protect the grid.

Electric generation utilities are required to maintain a 15% reserve of excess power. Regional Transmission Organizations (RTOs) are required by federal law to issue emergency alerts when excess or reserve electricity falls below 5%. On June 10, the electric reserve margin was predicted at 3.9%.

A reserve margin is a safety net for the grid of spare power plants that are available to generate electricity when supplies are tight.



Crow Wing Power and our power suppliers also implemented all load control or load management systems available to help alleviate the shortage of power. We have approximately 12,000 homes that utilize some sort of load management like controlled interruptible air conditioning, where we cycle participating members central air 15 minutes on and 15 minutes off during controlled times.

In extreme situations, MISO is able to coordinate controlled blackouts to maintain reliability of the bulk electric system. You may recall the February Texas

disaster where controlled blackouts were implemented during the polar vortex. The Texas grid operator that worked the rolling blackouts was from the electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT).

In a public appeal you might ask why should I conserve power when I pay an electric bill to be comfortable? In an extreme situation, everyone can do a little to help keep the lights on. We encourage members to conserve electricity during high demand times for several reasons. Keeping the power on is perhaps the number one reason, but the cost of wholesale power is extremely important as well.

In the right hand column is a chart of the real time cost of wholesale electricity from one of our power suppliers during the past couple of months.

MISO ensures the reliable delivery of electricity, at the lowest cost, across high-voltage power lines in 15 U.S. States and the Canadian province of Manitoba. 42 million Americans depend on them to keep the power flowing. MISO also conducts transmission planning and manages the buying and selling of wholesale electricity in one of the world's largest energy markets.

MISO is a not-for-profit, member-based organization that does not own any electric generation or transmission facilities. It strictly manages the generation and flow of electricity across the high-voltage lines within the MISO territory.

Don't Overlook Rebate Offers >>>

Locally there's been a substantial increase in appliance purchases. We want to make sure members are aware of rebates. When the pandemic hit, it changed everything. According to Karen at Schroeders Appliance, appliance dealers have seen a huge increase in appliance sales, doubling or tripling numbers from previous years.

We have issued 51 refrigerator rebates since the beginning of the year and five freezer rebates. The pandemic drove people to buy freezers to stock up on food and there was a shortage of supply at the same time.

In our region, many people were making their cabins a permanent home. Others were working from home and using their appliances more frequently, or after using and looking at them so much, decided to upgrade. It's possible that stimulus payments played a role.

Similarly we're seeing a demand in the housing market and increased number of new service applications. There's a lot of building activity. Last year we had a 38% increase in new service applications over 2019 and this year there's another 38% increase over that.

Gifting Electric Bill Payments >>>

Occasionally we get calls from people wanting to pay for a friend or relative's electric bill. When the person asks what the bill amount, or balance,

electric use or account number is, we cannot give out information relating to any member's account.

We treat members' personal information and electric use data as confidential. That includes members' telephone numbers, social security number, account information, e-mail addresses, payment history and electric use and data received from our metering infrastructure.
